# RON AND CINDY'S BARBER AND STYLE SHOP

# Celebrating 50 successful years of serving the people of Roselle.





Ron's Barber Shop began in Roselle December 1959 located at 134 Bokelman Street. It was a success from the beginning. With Ron Kuhlmann's wit, interesting stories, and family friendliness, it became a meeting place for many even if they did not need a haircut that day. It was the best place in Roselle to find out what was really happening. You could also get Ron's biased opinion on all the politicians and what they were doing as well. Some of Roselle's longtime residents remember getting their haircuts from Ron as children. When long hair was popular in the 60's, he was known as the expert on flattops and crew cuts. As time went on, many of the long haired kids brought themselves and their children back to the expert.

Ron's daughter Cindy Kuhlmann graduated from barber school in 1984 and soon became an important part of the business and its name was changed to Ron's Barber & Styling Shop. In 1999, when the Gorski building was being torn down to make room for redevelopment, Ron purchased the shoe repair shop across the street at 123 Bokelman Street. The building was brought up to date. The name changed again to Ron & Cindy's Barber and Styling Shop. Services were extended for men, women and children to include hair coloring perms and highlights.

In 2000 the shop was turned over to Cindy Kuhlmann Keer, She continues to operate it with her husband John Kerr, Karen Rytel and Ron's granddaughter Ashley Palade.

The family friendly shop continues to serve the Roselle community.

### 4th OF JULY MEMORIES By Ray Hitzemann

When I was growing up in the 40's and 50's, the 4th of July meant only two things to me. That was fireworks and noise. I would start in the middle of June by ordering fireworks from an ad on the back page of a comic book. They always had big assortments at a very reasonable price. They had to be shipped by railway express, so I anxiously awaited the phone call from Earl Crandall at the Roselle train station that my treasured package had arrived.

Most of these items are now illegal in Illinois. There were Lady Fingers (small firecrackers that came in strings of 100). I would light the entire string at one time and it sounded like very loud popcorn popping. Next were the 2 inch fire crackers that were ignited separately. We would throw them in the culvert under the road by the creek. They made more noise that way. I would also place them under tin cans to see how far up in the air the can would go. My favorite of all was the cherry bomb. I like these because they would go off under water and cause a water spout. We also had sparklers, Roman Candles, regular rockets, bottle rockets, fountains and snakes.

If I wanted more of a variety I could go to Walter Krumweide's snack shop on Bloomingdale Road just south of the overhead bridge by the forest preserve. He sold fountains, and tanks or fire engines that would ignite and the shoot flames out of the back and make a loud whistling noise. The grand finale of the 4<sup>th</sup> was the fireworks display in Roselle at the baseball fields across from the American Legion Hall. Everyone would bring their blankets and lawn chairs to enjoy watching the exciting display in the night sky.
